Hawkesbury Disaster and Emergency Dashboard

Hawkesbury City Council has produced a new web-based dashboard to provide the community with a real-time single point of information during emergencies, including floods and bushfires. The dashboard is an innovative way to support the Hawkesbury community during weather related emergencies.

Volunteer groups, community organisations or local councils are invited to nominate their community-led project by Tuesday 15 June 2021.

The NSW Government's Get Ready Community Award recognises and celebrates the work communities do to prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters.

Following a year of unprecedented disasters in NSW including the black summer fires, flooding and then COVID-19, our communities have shown incredible resilience.

Community-led projects that help people prepare for and recover from disasters have never been more important.

Previous Award winners have included Kyogle Council for their <u>Managed Action Plan for</u> an <u>Emergency Evacuation Centre</u> and <u>Congewai Community Group for its Community</u> <u>Information Day with Millfield Rural Fire Brigade</u>, to prepare the rural community for the fire season.

Grants awarded for Net Zero Research and Innovation

Councils across the state were recently welcomed to apply for a share in the \$52,000 <u>Research and Innovation fund</u> from the NSW Government. The Fund aims to stimulate and test new ideas for emissions reductions through an evidence-based approach.

Three councils have now been awarded a share of this funding:

- 1. Campbelltown City Council: Creating a Spark energy sharing communities' project
- Lake Macquarie City Council: Vehicle-to-Grid charging trial for council's fleet vehicles
- 3. Bathurst Regional Council: Closing the Gap on Food Waste project

Development of latest regional climate projections hits the mark with stakeholders

In December 2020, the Department of Planning, Industry & Environment's Climate and Atmospheric Branch, delivered three virtual stakeholder information sessions in support of the development of the next generation of <u>NSW and ACT Regional Climate</u> <u>Modelling</u> (NARCliM) data, known as 'NARCliM2.0.'

The highly interactive sessions brought together over 100 participants from across Australia and from a range of sectors including government, private, infrastructure, academia and industry to discuss formal design recommendations for NARCliM2.0. The findings of the sessions highlighted the robust scientific design and its alignment with the priorities and needs of stakeholders.

Adaptation takes centre stage at the Climate Action Professional Officers Group

The Climate Action Professional Officers Group (POG) was started in December 2020 and has attracted over 50 council participants for each of its first two meetings. The POG aims to facilitate consultation and collaboration between council and state government staff to develop programs and resources to meet the local council needs.

At the second POG meeting on Thursday 18 March, the meeting focussed on the intersection of adaptation, mitigation, planning and climate change in the built environment. Attendees heard about:

- The Department's Low Emissions Building Materials initiative
- Western Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (WSROC) <u>Urban Heat Planning</u> <u>Toolkit</u>
- Waverley Council's Future Proofing Residential Development to Climate Change
